Nutrition and Dietetics conducted a program driven by FSSAI initiative Aaj Se Thoda Kam - Eat Right Campaign Challenges Innovation on September 24, 2018 at Sir Vithaldas Thackersey College of Home Science (Autonomous) in collaboration with FSSAI (Maharashtra), FDA (Maharashtra), AFST(I), IDA(Mumbai Chapter), and Yoga Institute (Santacruz, Mumbai). Under the aegis of the IQAC Committee, the Family and Child Enrichment Centre (FACE) of the Department of Human Development was inaugurated on October 7, 2018. Feedback Obtained

The institution implemented the restructured syllabus in 2016- 2017 for First-Year students, 2017-2018 for the Second-Year students and the Third-Year students in 2018-2019. Sir Vithaldas Thackersey College of Home Science being an autonomous college has followed a semester system ever since its inception. The curriculum was designed time to time keeping in mind the professional competencies required by the industry. In lieu with the progressive nature, the college restructured the syllabus and introduced the Honors program of 140 credits in the year 2016 - 17. The first batch of students graduated with the newly restructured syllabus in the year 2018 -19. Experts from various Industries are members on the Board of Studies for their professional inputs for curriculum enhancement. The content of each subject was revised and restructured at the Department level and proposed and passed for approval through the Board of Studies. A structured questionnaire was designed for each of the stakeholders and a curriculum feedback was sought online. A brief outcome of the findings are stated below: The College has enhanced the library facilities by purchasing new books on relevant subjects as Reference study material. The feedback has prompted the seeking of membership of the US Consulate Library at Dosti House, that holds screening of documentaries and discussions in which the faculty and students participate. The stakeholders had stressed on the weightage given to entrepreneurship. The Alumni Association of the Institution has inaugurated the Entrepreneurship Incubation Cell that will benefit new graduate aspirants. This will help promote skill/ vocational development. The curriculum is focussed at improving employability through formalising a Placement Cell. The Departments have a database of prospective Employers, who can also be the resource persons. Incorporation of latest advancements in the subject has been possible with the linkages with the Industry. The Institution has been proactive in including the perspectives of the feedback system for taking remedial action in striving towards excellence in the quality of education. Further, the analysis of the feedback and recommendations of the Board are presented to the Academic Council for approval. ### 2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Sir Vithaldas Thackersey College of Home Science (Autonomous) has a robust and effective mentoring system for students. The college considers it as one of the best practices as it has helped the students in their overall development. The college follows a standardised protocol for the mentoring system. All the students are divided into groups of 20-25. Each group is allotted a mentor from the teaching faculty. This information is made available to the students at the beginning of the academic term. The students are oriented about the mentoring practice of the college and the availability of the batch mentor for any discussion on academic or personal issues. The areas discussed by the batch mentors include the following – 1. Importance of attendance (75 attendance as being mandatory) and regularity is stressed. 2. The students are made aware of the learning outcomes for each course. Their attention is drawn towards the unique curriculum and use of multiple resources and innovative methodologies in teaching-learning process every semester to make teaching interesting and student centric. 3. They are also sensitized and engaged towards the institutional Anti-ragging measures and Zero tolerance towards sexual harassment. 4. The mentors are available to resolve issues related to the functional aspects and logistics of the teaching learning process. 5. One of the salient features of the mentoring process is ensuring the mental wellbeing of the students. The Family and Child Enrichment center (FACE center) is dedicated to this cause. Workshops on life skills such as stress management, social skills are undertaken along with availability for individual counselling 6. The physical wellbeing of the students is given equal importance. Information about sessions on yoga and sports facility is made available to the students. Inhouse Doctor's facility is made available to the students. The students are encouraged to report to the mentor any issues they face related to college so that it can be resolved at the earliest. The mentoring of students is an ongoing process which encompasses meetings on a regular basis. The Class Representatives and Gymkhana Representatives of the batch are encouraged to monitor the group concerns and issues, and report to the mentors for the intervention needed.

The College is the constituent and autonomous college of the SNDT Women's University. The premise of College is a part of the composite building of the
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S.N.D.T. Women's University, Juhu, Mumbai. The College actively supports and participates in initiatives taken up by the University in all aspects of developing the physical facilities as required and maintenance of premises. The College is recipient of the CPE Phase III and RUSA 2 grant. Maintenance of the infrastructure is one of the priorities of the College in utilization of the grants. The College has been in position to acquire advance academic tools, library resources, technology enabled teaching equipments. Purchase and Finance: The College has Working Committee for Grants. Being autonomous college, there are statutory bodies which monitor and follow the protocol for utilization of the grants. Varied requirements are put forth by the departments and other committees to the Principal. Quotations of equipment or material above Rs. 5,000/- are invited by the purchase committee based on detailed specifications. This is further taken up for approval in the Finance board, based on the expenditure planned. All the purchases require an administrative approval through statutory bodies like Finance Board and Board of Management (Governing Body) and defined protocols as per the Maharashtra Accounts Code are followed. College is completely ICT enabled and has dedicated computer resource centre. The ICT committee oversees the up-gradation and maintenance of instruments, internet facilities and peripherals. ICT policy envisages roadmap to strengthen the digitization, MIS, customized software development and technology enabled learning. Annual Maintenance Contract for computers, software updating, license renewal, net facilities, printers, scanners has been given to agencies and operation maintenance personnel are available for specific requirements. Any up gradation of computers and related programs are discussed with the technical experts and finalized. The ICT policy is defined to take care of the requirements like LAN, BYOD zones, 24 X 7 internet facility, NAS storage etc. Most of the classrooms are equipped with fixed projectors, screens, and computers. For day to day requirements a resident technician is available from 10 am to 6 pm on all working days. Library Advisory Committee recommends as well as approves books and library related equipment required for academic purposes. It takes care of all the decision making related to library necessities. College premises such as classrooms, staffrooms, corridors, office blocks, toilet blocks, common spaces are maintained by non-teaching, class IV employees. The process of house keeping is streamlined by designating specific areas to the non-teaching staff. The HOD supervises the department laboratories and staff areas. Electrical maintenance - Equipment such as Overhead projectors, Television, Digital Projectors and other audio visual tools are maintained regularly by electrician appointed by the College. Civil and structural maintenance is addressed with the help of the University Maintenance Department. The university engineer surveys the premises and proposes corrective action, which is implemented by the College. Part of the grants acquired by the institution are employed in the major repair works of the premises.

## **CRITERION VI – GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT**

### **6.1 – Institutional Vision and Leadership**

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

Sir Vithaldas Thackersey College of Home Science, (Autonomous), follows a decentralized system of Governance, Leadership and Management in implementation of its activities. The five departments, namely, Food Nutrition and Dietetics, Human Development, Mass Communication and Extension, Resource Management and Textiles and Apparel Designing conduct curricular and co-curricular activities channelized through the Heads of the Department and the Principal acts as a guide to ensure the smooth functioning of the departments and their activities.

One of the activities that exhibits the process of decentralization is Community Outreach Program followed by most of the departments of the college. The Community Outreach Program follows a three-pronged approach which is based on the curriculum and social commitment to 'reach the unreached'. The first step is to channelize the Community Outreach Programs through the credit based instructional activities in various subjects of the departments. The second step is the adoption of communities so as to sustain the work and get committed efforts. The third step is to provide for non-credit based instructional activities. The implementation of these however rests entirely on the discretion of the Heads of the Department who with the assistance of the staff



members take it to the students who work with the local leaders and plan and execute the Community Outreach Programs. The example of this is the activity undertaken by the Department of Mass Communication and Extension. 'Community Outreach Program' is a six credit practical course which has taken its shape after the deliberations in the statutory bodies. The course activities are implemented via the designated Non Governmental Organizations through whom a community is selected. The student leaders are a part of the selection of the community as per requirements of the course. The students plan and conducted specific activities under this course along with other programs such as, celebration of special days, entertainment programs, awareness of civic duties etc which do not fall under the academic frame work but enhance the connect with their community. All these activities undertaken by the students, staff are independently conducted. The second example of complete decentralization is the functioning of the Sir Vithaldas Thackersey College of Home Science Alumni Association (Registered). The functioning of the Association is completely independent and decentralized. The Association in the Month of March, 15, 2019 organized a seminar to initiate the Entrepreneurship Incubation and Placement Cell. The association invited experts who could throw light on the concept of Entrepreneurship Incubation and Placement Cell and the alumni shared their experiences in their journey as entrepreneurs. The alumni entrepreneurs also put up stalls to showcase their product/services. All this was organized and executed with the Alumni members of the college, ex-students and the Principal showed the path for the successful implementation of the program.

Curriculum Development	Regularly revising and updating of the curriculum is the result of incorporating the feedback of various stake holders of the institution. Inputs provided by the students, faculty, employers, alumni, industry and other reputed organisations are used to design a vast array of course leading to knowledge, skill development as well as career enrichment of the students. M. Design (Fashion Design) was initiated, curriculum for its second year was developed, learning and evaluation rubrics were defined for the first year. The learning outcomes and evaluation rubrics were also developed for most of the courses offered to the third year students of the undergraduate program.
Teaching and Learning	Teaching and Learning- The institution has a strong learner-centric teaching ethos. The teaching plans were integrated with Innovative teaching practices. Learning experiences were further enhanced with the help of a number of Field projects, Industrial

visits, Field visits and Educational trips. This enables students to integrate basic concepts learnt in classrooms to the industrial or real world settings. Problem based learning, case studies and experiential learning and many more modes of learning were used to cater to the various learners in the classrooms.

**Examination and Evaluation**

**Examination and Evaluation-** The examination system and the evaluation form the backbone of the college. The college strives to make progress in this area in order to make it efficient and transparent. The digitization has become a norm for the Examination Department of the college. In October 2018 select First Year subjects were evaluated online. In April 2019 all the First Year subjects were evaluated online. The results were promptly declared within 30 days from the last date of the examination on the college website. Examination planning and scheduling is done through automated invigilation timetable. The Learning disability students were given 20 minutes extra for each hour of the paper. For a sick or student ailing the venue was shifted to doctor's room or some other convenient place in the college.

**Research and Development**

**Research and Development-** Development of attitude of scientific inquiry and research in students has been successfully inculcated through courses like Research Methods and Issues and trend in specialization subjects in respective specializations. This integrates research activities into the curriculum. Research Cell was initiated in 2018-19. Four MOU's were signed, 16 papers published in the peer reviewed journals. Two research projects are underway, National and International. Three teaching faculty were awarded Ph.D. degree. Initiatives were undertaken taken by the institute to encourage research and development activities for students and teachers. Students were also encouraged to develop various services, end products after in-depth need assessment and market research. Students and Faculty were oriented to Plagiarism check of their assignments work. Teachers were encouraged to apply for the Faculty

Improvement Program , Two teachers have taken advantage of the same.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

The College is the constituent and autonomous college of the SNTD Women's University. It is situated in the composite building of S.N.D.T. University. It is recipient of the CPE Phase III and RUSA 2 grant. Advance academic tools, library resources, technology enabled teaching equipments are used for the teaching learning. The college is ICT enabled, has dedicated computer resource centre, classrooms equipped with fixed projectors, screens, and computers. Civil and structural maintenance is addressed by the University Maintenance Department. Library provides database of the books making it easier for their search and retrieval with the help of SLIM software.

Human Resource Management

Human Resource Management: The welfare of the staff members is at the apex of all the initiatives of the college. The matters related to the service and the retirement of all faculty and non-teaching staff in this academic year were completed on time. For the non-teaching staff the college collaborated with Kasturba Health and Research Society, Medical Research Center Mumbai, to conduct a complete health check up supported with medical counselling by the doctors of the MRC. The faculty and the students of the department of Food Nutrition and Dietetics took this endeavour forward by conducting body composition analysis and provided customised dietary counselling with follow-up. This quality initiative motivated the non-teaching staff towards increased awareness to maintain healthy diet and lifestyle.

Industry Interaction / Collaboration

Industry Interaction / Collaboration: The college strives to connect with the Industry and ensures that useful linkages and collaborations with the professional and entrepreneurial sectors are created for the benefit of students. This is done to provide an opportunity to the students to get connected with the industry. The students benefit by getting practical experience in the field, inputs from guest speakers from the industry, internships and placements. The college

signed 4 MOUs and an Entrepreneurship Incubation and Placement Cell was initiated in order to do hand-holding of the budding entrepreneurial attempts of the students.

**Admission of Students**

The process of admission for the student is an important task in any college. The college follows online admission process through SNTD Womens University portal and College website portal. The information is communicated through Website, PR Committee and Help Desk manned by student volunteers. The College facilitates and guides candidates and their parents/ guardians for understanding the scope of all specializations through college website, academic display, brochures and a College film screened during the admission process. The admission list is generated on the website based on merit and preferences of specializations opted by the students is displayed.

Sir Vithaldas Thackersey College of Home Science (Autonomous) is a constituent college of S.N.D.T. Women's University, Mumbai. It is located in the huge composite building in Juhu campus of the University. In this composite building, there are one conducted college, four University departments, a big University Hostel, one Auditorium, spacious University Library, Four Administrative offices, one administrative department, University virtual classroom, a big conference room and also a Bank. There is a school for special children and also a nursery school which are attached to the respective University departments. As per the initial plan the entire building was designed for Home Science faculty which later on changed and now the building

is used by multiple stakeholders. There is a limitation in assigning the exact areas for electricity consumption in the composite building of the University which houses the College. There are designated electricity meters. The College pays approximately 40 of the total electricity bill of the composite building. In the year 2018-19 the College appointed an external agency to conduct Energy Audit of the College premises. Initial data needed was kept ready which included floor plan of the College, number of lighting and electrical fixtures along with the electrical equipments used in the College. The Audit gave an idea of the actual electricity consumption in the College. Solar panels are set up at SNDTWU Juhu campus in 2018. The solar energy is fed to the main grid supplying electricity to the entire campus. Thus the renewable energy coming from the solar panels the overall electricity consumption is reduced in the campus. S.N.D.T. Women's University has a 20 acre campus at Juhu, Mumbai. It has adopted Solar Energy from 2018. The focus is energy conservation for environment-friendly future and pollution free campus. Solar Energy Corporation of India (SECI), Government of India has allotted the rooftop solar amenities to the University for installation of the 1540 solar panels. Aditya Green Energy Private Limited, Mumbai is the Project Proponent. The set up generates 1917 KWH (Kilo Watt-Hours) per day and 7,00,000 KWH per year. The Solar set up is expected to reduce electricity bills by 80.

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7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

1. Department of Resource Management had organized the Annual Exhibition "NIRMITI 2019" with a main theme of "Creative Upscaling" and sub theme of "Optical Illusion" on 15th, 16th and 17th March 2019. The interior design students created various articles using waste material from college. The Hospitality students created an illusionary photo booth upscaling different articles from the college. 2. Banners for Annual day or any other College program including Seminars, Conferences and posters for presentation are printed on cloth. 3. Students of Interior Design and Resource Management during the practical sessions use drawing board for manual drafting. These boards are made of wood and hence needs to be covered by sheet of paper for drafting. Additionally, during the course the students draft on TK sheets for all their practical assignments. In case of changes to be made in the assignment the students redraft their assignment on a new sheet. The old sheets are collected and are used as backing paper for the next batch. TK sheets are used for final practical examination. The corrected sheets which are kept in the department are also reused as backing papers for all the boards for the next batch. 4. The College organizes various programs and seminars. During any program organized by the institution the guests are welcomed at the beginning of the program. The traditional method of gifting bouquet of flowers is replaced by gifting them Bamboo plants. These bamboo plants have a longer life and can be kept at home and office. 5. The College celebrates its Annual Day in the month of December. As a part of tradition the Chief Guest, Guest of Honor and other dignitaries are felicitated with gifts. The College took an initiative of gifting the guests with eco - friendly products. The gifts were outsourced from an agency which specializes in eco - friendly products (kheti.com). The staff and

students felicitated during the program were also gifted with eco - friendly products. 6. Each Department in the College is provided by printers. All official documents (if hard copy is required) are printed in the department. The cartridge used for printing are refilled on exhaustion instead of buying new cartridges. Each cartridge is refilled on a continuous basis to avoid E-waste.

Best Practice - 1 1. Title of the Practice 'Earn While you Learn' Scheme -A Student-friendly Initiative Activity: Student managed Help Desk during admission 2. Objectives of the Practice ? To provide job opportunity and stipend during summer break under the 'Earn While you Learn' scheme ? To enable the students gain confidence in managing people and in improving communication skills ? To develop rapport between volunteering students and aspiring entrants ? To provide information about the various academic programs offered by the College ? To answer admission queries by orienting them about the pre-requisites for the different programs 3. The Context Sir Vithaldas Thackersey College of Home Science (Autonomous) offers unique academic programs. The aided degree program is BSc in Home Science which offers choice of seven specializations. The College offers many self-financed programs such as post-graduate degree programs [M.Sc. Specialized Dietetics, M. Design (Fashion Design)] and various certificate and diploma courses. The college has maximized its academic autonomy since 1995 and has developed innovative courses with Choice Based Credit System (CBCS). Students seeking admission find the structure of the programs different from those offered elsewhere. The College trains volunteers to assist parents and students in the admission process. A helpdesk was arranged and manned by student volunteers during the admission period under the 'Earn While You Learn' scheme. 4. The Practice Student volunteers were selected for manning the helpdesk every year to assist in the admissions process. Looking at the positive response from students seeking admission, the college decided to take a step forward and provide remuneration to the students. This initiative motivated students to apply under the scheme 'Earn While You Learn' for a summer job. Augmenting support through help desk: Admissions process is stressful to parents and students in making right choice for higher education. There are a lot of colleges offering different types of programs at degree and post graduate levels. Parents and students look for clarity regarding the right programs suitable to the students' caliber and interest. It is imperative that colleges have understood this need and have developed websites to provide information regarding their courses. It should be understood that these parents and students are from different socio-economic backgrounds and may not be technologically enabled. Some parents would like to have a face to face interaction and collect information regarding admission process. Students seeking admission find it very encouraging to gather information from their senior students about the program, facilities and environment of the college. Being a Women's College, there are enquiries from parents and students from other districts of Maharashtra and different states. Keeping this in mind, the Student Welfare Committee identifies second year students who can work at the helpdesk during the summer vacation. Usually they work for the entire month of May and June and if required in the first week of July depending on the admission schedule for FYBSc. I. Selection process: a. Students are asked to apply for this scheme during the month of March. b. The student welfare committee shortlists the students and recruits the volunteers. Volunteers are selected to man the desk during the months of May and June. II. Orientation and Training: a. The students are oriented to all the programs offered by the College. b. The list of FAQ's with answers is discussed with them. c. Procedure for recording information about the admission query is



taught. d. Important dates regarding application, submissions (online and offline), essential documents to be submitted, entrance exams, choice of programs and fees payment to be shared. e. Students are advised to distribute brochures, pamphlets etc. to parents and prospective students. III. Help Desk: a. A Helpdesk is set up near the entrance of the College along with display of informative charts about various academic programs and important notices regarding admission. b. Helpdesk students meet all the visitors and solve their queries. Teaching faculty is also available for any further assistance. c. A register is maintained to record the name of the caller / visitor along with the contact details. d. In case a query is not solved by volunteers they take help of the teaching faculty. Then they contact the concerned person to give the required information. 5. Evidence of Success ? This initiative boosts the confidence of employed students in handling enquires and people management. It also enhances their communication skills. ? More students wish to apply for this scheme due to monetary benefits. ? The parents of the first generation learners benefit by direct interaction with the volunteers in regional language. ? It helps in easing out work pressure on the staff. ? It clarifies any doubts regarding the courses, programs and admission formalities. ? Students get guidance to choose specializations and optional courses (subjects). ? Appreciative feedback from parents was received during the orientation program post admission that provision of the help desk was very beneficial during the entire admission process. 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required a. Detailed mentoring by the faculty is required to train the volunteers. b. Subject choices and information about the various courses in the programs may not be conveyed in detail as the volunteer may not be from that specialization. Best Practice - 2 1. Title of the Practice: Three - tier orientation program - Leap to a new beginning 2. Objectives of the Practice ? To orient the first year students regarding the rules and regulations of the Senior College ? Different structure of the degree program offered by the Autonomous College (B.Sc. Honors - 140 Credits, B.Sc. Regular - 120 Credits, with 7 specializations) ? CBCS - Choice Based Credit System - offering choice of Generic Electives and Discipline Specific Elective courses over 6 semesters ? To acquaint them about internal and external assessment for theory/ practical courses and unique pattern of continuous assessment ? To familiarize the new students with the physical infrastructure of the College (situated in a composite building in the University campus) ? To familiarize the parents about the College infrastructure and orientation about the degree programs 3. The Context ? There are vast differences which the students experience in all the systems in Junior and Senior College. e.g. Semester system, pattern of examination etc. ? This practice helps students to be more confident in the new environment. ? The College is situated in a composite building with many other University Departments, Central Library, Hostel, Administrative Offices, Bank, Auditorium etc. ? The classrooms and laboratories are spread over 4 levels and have their entrances from various corridors and even terrace which is quite perplexing to newcomers. ? The students are grouped for their various courses and need to go to different rooms and laboratories during the day. ? Classes usually start immediately after the orientation day hence it is pertinent that the students know the location of their classes in advance. 4. The Practice The College has started following initiatives for the new entrants. I. Common orientation for parents and students (Tier I): a. Welcome address by Principal, Introduction of HOD and staff, Chairpersons of various Committees, Counsellor, Student Welfare Schemes and Scholarship and Medical facilities with in- house doctor. b. Examination and library orientation II. Department orientation (Tier II): a. Introduction of Department staff, Course teachers and Mentors b. Orientation to courses and activities with perspective to local, regional, national and global relevance. c. Parents are given information about the attendance rules, honors program, parent - teacher meeting, and meeting the HOD with prior permission. III. Tour of the college premises (Tier III): a. The

senior students are identified as volunteers to assist the faculty in the entire process of orientation and touring the campus. 5. Evidence of Success a. The feedback received from first year students that the orientation has helped them to familiarize with the different departments and the official procedures followed for day to day activities. b. The orientation process promotes interaction of the first year students with peers. c. The feedback has encouraged the college to continue this practice and improve the process of orientation to minimize the problems encountered. d. Parents are assured that their children are able to understand the college rules and regulations. e. Over the years there has been an observation that the first year students get familiarized with the campus post the college tour. The next day these students can locate the notice board for their timetables, classrooms, official procedures like making ID cards, Railway Concession forms, procedure to apply for student lockers, hostel procedures and submission of official documents for completion of admission process. 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required a. Volunteers who can communicate in English and vernacular language need to be identified keeping in mind the inclusive approach of the institution. b. Orientation process is a full day activity with a detailed schedule which requires a proper planning and execution.

### 7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 – Provide the details of the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust in not more than 500 words

The College practices the mandate of SNDTWU, "An enlightened woman is a source of infinite strength" and are empowering girl students through a well-planned and structured activities focusing on the holistic development and a learner centric pedagogy. Enlightened women are the building blocks of a healthy nation. In this endeavor, the College takes pride in training women and society by being an integral part of the National initiative of 'Eat Right India' campaign - with a focus of creating a healthy, safe and sustainable environment. It has taken a lead role through its student led initiatives to promote healthy lifestyle and educate people at large. The College strives to create awareness about inclusion of safe, nutritious and healthy food in the daily diet for various age groups. In this effort the college has initiated the following activities: 1. Masters students of Specialized Dietetics had conducted anthropometric measurements, diet survey and diet counseling for the non-teaching staff of the college. This initiative was welcomed, appreciated by the non-teaching staff and they implemented the suggestions given to them in their daily diet. 2. The college in collaboration with The Yoga Institute, Mumbai had encouraged the students to organize food festivals. Healthy and tasty recipes for lunch box were prepared and displayed in stalls with the nutritional information and approximately 1000 visitors from community were given an opportunity to sample the food. The recipes were printed in a booklet and distributed to all the visitors. 3. Intercollegiate competition was organized for the concept of "Aaj Se Thoda Kam", where students prepared and displayed healthy recipes. The importance of good physical and mental health, right diet, choice of foods and sustainability in food were emphasized to the audience. 4. The concept of healthy eating needs to be initiated from the school. The college has partnered with FSSAI, Corporate partner of Pepsico and Schools. Nearly 60 schools were selected which include Government run BMC schools and Private schools. The students in groups pursued the activity as per the guidelines issued by collaborating agencies. The sessions were also adapted to different setup and infrastructure available in the halls / auditoriums or

in combined classes or class to class session, with the help of AV and /or placards / skit. In all, 81, 000 students were given education across all schools in Mumbai. 5. Importance of proper nutrition for pregnant and lactating mothers to ensure a healthy offspring has been advocated by the students in their nutrition education programs in community and family enrichment centres.

6. Adolescent nutrition plays an important role in developing the future workforce. Screening for obesity and inclusion of healthy food practices through Knowledge, Attitude and Practice surveys have been advocated for high school and College students. 7. The College has pledged to create an "Eat right, Eat safe and Eat sustainable" campus. The College encourages these activities to promote social and behavior changes in dietary patterns, nutrition and in choosing right foods.

The research cell will facilitate creating platform and opportunities which will strengthen efforts in this direction. It will also help the institution to collaborate with other organisations to conduct research activities. 3. Digitization of the Examination Department Sir Vithaldas Thackersey College of Home Science is an Autonomous College which has an independent Examination Department. In an endeavor to make it more robust, transparent and efficient, there is a sustained effort to digitize the important functions undertaken by the department. The college plans to implement the same in a phased manner. The institution plans to digitize the exam records, conducting examination, assessment and declaration of results. In the Academic Year 2019-20 the institution will be standardizing the customized software for the department and will initiate the online assessment process. 4. Creation and Compilation of E-resources With the increase in number of innovative teaching learning methodologies used by the staff, creation and compilation of these e-resources will be undertaken. This will create a rich database of teaching-learning resources for slow and advanced learners. 5.
